# Year 9 Woodwork and **Exploring Watercolours at Dumbartung**

In Year 9 Woodwork, Shyann and Jacqueeta proudly showcase the tables they've meticulously crafted. These young ladies diligently followed instructions and observed demonstrations, ensuring their projects were completed to a very high standard this semester.

The Fold-a-Way Table comprises three main sections:

Frame Sections: Two sections form the frame, connected by a halve housing joint.

Tabletop: The third section serves as the tabletop.

All sections are securely joined, their width increased using a biscuit joiner. The tabletop attaches to the body sections via table clips underneath, providing stability. Remarkably, this table can be swiftly disassembled with just one screwdriver, making it easily transportable and space-saving. When needed, it can be reassembled as an occasional table.





Skills acquired during this project include:

- Measuring
- · Dry Assembly
- Marking out
- Assembly
- Biscuit Jointing
  Sanding
- Routing
- · Finishing/Polishing

A complimentary workbook reinforces these skills, empowering Shyann and Jacqueeta to apply them across various woodworking contexts. I encourage them to utilise these abilities in future practical subjects and other learning endeavours.

Robert Eggington of Dumbartung extended an invitation to a group of senior boys for an immersive painting experience.

The boys' initial session with Robert was captured in the photograph to the right, marking their introduction to the realm of Watercolours. The images displayed are crafted in "monochrome", a technique that employs a single colour. This art form involves diluting the original colour to generate shades, thereby adding depth to the perspective.

In the subsequent session, Robert imparted the skills to depict rocks and illuminate trees and the backdrop, enhancing the depth and appeal of the painting. The boys' time with Robert was thoroughly enjoyable, marked by the most serene silence I have ever witnessed!

## The Year 11 and 12 Foundation students

The Year 11 students commenced their final unit looking at an overview of religion in Australian society. They began by reflecting on the things that make us unique; how who we are is influence by the community we are born into. This community makes up

our culture, which is a mixture of values, customs and beliefs or a particular worldview. By understanding about the many factors that make us who we are, we then turned our attention to becoming more aware of the people that we share this world with, understanding the importance and need for empathy in today's modern world. Students were then introduced to the Australian bureau of statistics, as we went on a learning journey focused on the changing religious landscape in Australia.



Unit 4 for our Year 12's looks at the role religion plays in the actions of groups within society. The first of these modules looks at why people are motivated to become involved with the work of a religious group or organisation from the past or present, moving on into how religion is then reflected through the actions and beliefs of this group or organisation. Students went on a learning journey reviewing a COMPASSION wide range of companies or organisations, listing their mission statements, beliefs and values. It was through these they identified common traits of religious organisations around what drives them and dictates their actions within the wider community and the world.
